MISSION



RESCUE

Southwest Wildlife operates a 24/7/365 wildlife emergency hotline. We take calls around the clock to answer questions on wildlife, offer wildlife coexistence advice, and refer the community to additional wildlife resources. Our trained team of volunteers communicates quickly to dispatch a rescue volunteer or team of volunteers whenever needed. The animals are then safely transported to our veterinary clinic.

REHAB



Once an animal arrives at Southwest Wildlife, they begin receiving top-of-the-line medical care. This process begins with a thorough intake exam. It is followed up by specialized diet, medication, and wound care as needed. Depending on the animal and their needs, our team of volunteer and staff vets and vet techs complete all surgeries, x-rays, and intensive care within our state-of-the-art clinic. After an animal no longer needs intensive care, they are moved to our rehab area, where they are given ample time to recover without being overly exposed to humans.



RELEASE

We believe wildlife belongs in the wild. Our highly trained animal care staff and volunteers work hard to keep human contact to a minimum – keeping our animals as wild as possible. Once the animal is given a clean bill of health and deemed releasable, our staff and volunteers take them to a safe location to be released.

SANCTUARY




Some animals that come through our doors could not survive in the wild. Many have injuries that prevent them from being released, while others were kept as pets and have imprinted on humans. Non-releasable animals can live out their lives peacefully in our accredited sanctuary. Southwest Wildlife is the only sanctuary in Scottsdale capable of caring for large mammals such as black bears, mountain lions, and endangered Mexican gray wolves. Many of our sanctuary residents live on our tour route, giving us an opportunity to educate the public on these magnificent animals while teaching them how to safely coexist with wildlife.



EDUCATION

We believe that knowledge is power. Our vision includes the inspiration of conservation of native wildlife through educational programs, tours, events, and community building. Through onsite, offsite, and virtual programming, social media engagement, and marketing efforts, Southwest Wildlife staff and volunteers work endlessly to teach the public how to safely coexist with wildlife in Arizona.

IMPACT



Another astounding year for rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing wildlife in Arizona! In 2023, 385 wild animals were rescued. Of those, 276 were able to be saved through around the clock care, life saving surgeries, and specialized medical and dietary intervention. For those who survived, 222 were released, and 39 were still pending release as of the end of 2023. That brings us to a 90% release rate in 2023 – meaning many wild animals are back where they belong, all because of you.

So many things have happened at Southwest Wildlife over the past year! From our *busiest* baby season yet, to *five* new sanctuary residents, we can't wait to share the highlights with you.

A Ringtail Rescue

Although this isn't the first ringtail Southwest Wildlife has seen, they are a rarity. Even as Arizona's state mammal, we don't often see them in need of rescue! Thankfully, when a staff member at a saloon in Tortilla Flats found him, they were quick to call Southwest Wildlife.

This adventurous little guy was found in a fry-oil disposal container. Although it was mostly empty, the leftover oil mixed with rainwater made it impossible for him to climb out. Once restaurant staff found him, they attempted to rinse off the oil. Unfortunately, the shock from his experience left the ringtail shivering, breathing heavily, and unable to move.

Southwest Wildlife rescue volunteers arrived as quickly as they could. They brought the ringtail to our clinic where he received a warm bath, oil removal, and a full checkup.

He has currently received a clean bill of health and is feeling stronger everyday.

While he recovers, he will receive a specialized diet, medication as needed, and a warm, quiet space to regain his strength.

We are grateful for the wildlife warriors who helped us rescue this ringtail – from our hotline staff to our rescue team, we couldn't do it without you.











5 New Sanctuary Residents

This has been a busy year at Southwest Wildlife! We have welcomed FIVE new sanctuary residents. Check out their stories!

CUBBY

Cubby is a small gray fox born in February of 2023. Someone picked her up thinking she was orphaned, and kept her too long - making her far too friendly with humans.

Due to her imprinting, Cubby lives in the Southwest sanctuary. She is on our tour route and shares an enclosure with Frank and Boots, fellow gray foxes.

Her favorite activities include playing with her fox friends and running through her enrichment tube!

ECHO & DASH

Echo & Dash are the two newest adolescent mountain lions! After being found orphaned in the White Mountains, these kittens came to Southwest Wildlife. Unfortunately, their mother died in a car accident – making them unreleasable with nobody to teach them to be wild.

Over the summer, Southwest Wildlife ran a kitten naming fundraiser – resulting in the names Echo & Dash, almost \$20,000 in donations, and nationwide news coverage. They truly are America's mountain lions!

FERN

Fern was found orphaned at only a few weeks old. Her parents were nowhere to be found, and her sibling already deceased. With nobody to rely on, it was determined Fern needed Southwest Wildlife.

Volunteer Rescuers transported her all the way from Payson, AZ. Upon arrival, Fern was cared for around the clock by our dedicated Animal Care team.

Fern now lives on the tour route in an outdoor enclosure – complete with a pool, branches, and evap cooler for the hot summer months. She has made herself right at home and quickly stolen our hearts!

CHI

Chi is a young coati found in Tucson. After he fell in a cave, Chi's mom was unable to be located. Rescuers attempted to reunite mother and baby for several days, but they were unsuccessful. Chi was taken in temporarily by a wildlife center in Tucson, then transferred to Southwest Wildlife by the Arizona Game & Fish Dept. Chi was deemed happy & healthy, and recently transitioned to a large outdoor enclosure where he is thriving! Chi means "energy" in Chinese medicine and culture. It's the perfect name for him - he is always running & playing in his enclosure!









Caught Between a Fence and a Hard Place

In the Fall of 2023, our rescue line got a call from a homeowner in North Central Phoenix - a coyote had entered their yard and gotten stuck between a large planter and their block wall.

The coyote appeared to have an injured leg due to a leg trap – this can be seen in the second photo. Several rescue team members began to coordinate – this scared coyote was truly stuck and appeared unable to get out on his own. Sedation was considered and several volunteers & staff members began to coordinate how to administrate the soothing drugs that would allow them to calm the coyote and remove him from the small space.

Our dedicated & experienced team continued to chat and brainstorm while waiting for staff to arrive with sedation drugs. Minutes before they arrived, we all received good news – our brave rescue volunteer had freed the coyote and contained him in a crate!

Miraculously, the leg trap was easy to remove and injuries appeared minimal. After a thorough check up at our clinic, this coyote was cleared as releasable and returned near his friends & family.

This happy ending is a pleasant surprise and a bold reminder – it's time to stop using leg traps.

COMMUNITY

2023 was the busiest year yet at Southwest Wildlife! We saw many guests we hadn't seen since before the pandemic and reached many new local communities and travelers alike for visits to the sanctuary. Many of our events sold out, our social media following grew, and we reached record numbers of volunteer impact.



In 2023, Southwest Wildlife's community grew more than ever before. We saw a total of 10,649 sanctuary visitors! Our team was able to improve event and guest processes, and we introduced many volunteers to our event and trail guide teams. Our volunteers were hard at work – serving a total of 18,976 hours! As our in–person community grew, so did our virtual following – we now have a total of 47,431 social media followers and 7,060 weekly newsletter readers. As our community grew, so did our team. Southwest Wildlife added and filled several new positions, as well as specific volunteer roles. We are thrilled with our growth over the past year and can't wait to see what 2024 has in store.

Annual revenue reached an all time high in 2023, exceeding \$4 million for our animals! 83% of our revenue came from generous donors just like you - helping us to rescue, rehab, and release more animals than ever before.

2023 showed a slight increase in cost – primarily due to the ever-rising expense of medical care and animal feed. Thankfully, due to our generous donors, we were able to help every animal that came through our doors – no animal was turned away. As always, Southwest Wildlife strives to put the majority of our money towards our animals, with program costs accounting for 79.4% of our annual expenses.
